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# 1. INTRO · ANOTHER RECORD YEAR FOR JOURNALISMFUND.EU

Almost €2.6 million went to 203 projects by 490 journalists and media from 66 countries. Should we be happy about this?

#### **Benefits**

As Journalismfund.eu enters its 25th anniversary in the industry, is there any reason to celebrate? It was in 1998 when friends, relatives and colleagues of the late Pascal Decroos came up with the idea to honour him by starting a fund in journalism. Love conquers all and the spirit of documentary filmmaker Pascal Decroos continues to this day.

Even then, it was the founders' conviction that the free market does not necessarily guarantee in-depth investigative journalism. That same year, this particular form of journalism hardly existed in Belgium and no change was on the horizon. So, journalism could only benefit from independent funding.

The Fund started in 1999 with a subsidy from the Flemish government. (At the time, it was only €184,000, an equivalent to the Flemish government's budget for advertisements in the Flemish press.) Not knowing exactly how to move forward, the founders took their cue from the <u>Dutch Fund for In-depth Journalism</u> and the American Fund for Investigative Journalism.

Meanwhile, the Fund is entering its 25th year. Nobody ever imagined that this fund would last this long. In 2008, the board of the organisation decided to expand its reach: from supporting Flemish specialist journalism to supporting cross-border investigative journalism throughout the European continent. After all, most problems are international, power has shifted to international institutions, but journalism – and certainly investigative journalism – remained on the sidelines, so to speak. Journalismfund.eu went European.

In 2022 alone, the fund received 384 applications from 885 journalists and media outlets from 84 countries. Journalismfund.eu was able to support 203 projects this year, accounting for some €2.6 million in grant money. This benefited 490 recipients: 413 journalists (211 women and 202 men) and 77 media companies. In comparison to the two previous years, this is a big step forward.

By 2021, the number of projects supported increased by 50%, the number of beneficiaries by 70% and financial support by 138%. This increase is, of course, primarily due to growing donor support. More and more philanthropic organisations and governments are becoming convinced of the need to support journalism and of Journalismfund.eu's modus operandi. Indeed, it is too risky to donate to journalists directly; it may cause journalists to lose their independence. Financial support may even weaken rather than strengthen journalists' credibility. However, this is not the case with a hard and impenetrable partition, a neutral independent intermediary between the journalist and the donor. Journalismfund.eu occupies that unique position in Europe.

#### The greatest value comes from the journalists themselves

There are quite a few hurdles to overcome to apply for and receive a grant for investigative journalism: the language, finding colleagues in other countries, a good topic on which some preliminary research

may already have been done, the application process, a commitment from a media company, the risks, etc. In this respect, the Journalismfund.eu team helps as much as it can and plays an important role in making all this possible behind the scenes. The professionalism of the jurors and mentors and the commitment of the Journalismfund.eu board also lay the foundation for success. But in any case, the most important factor in this growth is the persistence of journalists who find the courage to conduct this kind of cross-border research. Their participation makes the difference.

In short, there are still several obstacles to tackle in investigative journalism, which is essential to a democratic system. A functioning democracy requires its citizens to be properly informed so that they can form well-founded opinions. Quality journalism provides information, acts as a watchdog and questions power structures. The better this 'fourth estate' functions, the stronger democracy will be.

To this end, it is essential that there are various quality journalistic channels and platforms to provide that important information. If citizens do not recognise themselves in what is being presented as news and in who is speaking, a gap grows between the information presented and the citizen to be informed. As a result, distrust and populism increase while the quality and democratic content of debate in society diminish.

Therefore, it is also important that citizens have access to high-quality journalism on every domain that shapes society (political, economic, scientific, cultural, social, etc.) and on every level where the influence of those domains is located: local, regional, national and international.

This kind of high-risk journalism does not always run smoothly. Sometimes resources prove insufficient, teams of journalists encounter bad luck or even develop contention among themselves. Frustration often arises because of the lack of sharing of information among government entities, companies and individuals. Often journalists risk *legal trouble*, harassment and being called names such as 'rotten fish' on social media. Lately, companies have been using *detective agencies* to shadow journalists and some governments have illegally installed bugging software on the mobile phones of troublesome journalists. In *Greece*, the debate is still raging.

Some have even paid for it with their own lives. In the past 20 years, 1,668 journalists have been killed, an average of 80 per year. Even though members of the Council of Europe agreed to protect journalism and the safety of journalists in April 2016, following the recommendations by several journalist organisations, nothing has happened so far.

Nobel Peace Prize winner Maria Ressa gave an apt description of the situation during <u>her speech in Oslo</u>: 'Democracy has become a woman-to-woman, man-to-man defence of our values. We're at a sliding door moment, where we can continue down the path we're on and descend further into fascism, or we can each choose to fight for a better world. To do that, you have to ask yourself: what are YOU willing to sacrifice for the truth?'

We consider it a great honour that Journalismfund.eu is trusted by so many applicants (885 in 2022). Risk management is also essential in the organisation. The anonymity of the journalists until publication (and sometimes until after publication) and non-disclosure of topics are motivated by security concerns. The way the organisation screens all journalists, the anonymity of the *jury members*, the *secure application platform*, the process of awarding grants, the drafting and discussion of contracts and budgets, the four-eyes principle for payments, the *ethical funding policy*, the *conflict of interest policy*, *mentorship*, follow-ups and communication, among others are all set up to minimise the risks, first and foremost, for the journalists and to maximise the quality and impact of the investigations.

Investigative journalism has become more and more established through the publications of the *International Consortium of Investigative Journalists (ICIJ)*. The publication of important documents such as *Offshore Leaks, Panama Papers, Paradise Papers, Pandora Papers* and *FinCEN Files* placed ICIJ's credibility up front. ICIJ caused quite a stir worldwide and inspired many journalists around the world. Credit to the *Global Investigative Journalism Network (GIJN)* and several of its members who provided knowledge sharing on investigative journalism in their conferences.

#### **Historical context**

In Europe, we can actually hardly speak of a decline in investigative journalism over the past 10 years. In fact, in many European countries, democracy is still relatively young and critical investigative journalism barely exists, if at all. Without wishing to go too far back in time, for example, Greece had a military regime until

1973. Portugal was freed from a 40-year authoritarian regime in 1974. Spanish dictator General Francisco Franco died in 1975. Most of the Eastern European countries only knew liberal ideology after the fall of the Berlin wall in 1989. Cyprus, Estonia Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Slovenia, Slovakia and the Czech Republic only became EU members in 2004, Bulgaria and Romania in 2007, and Croatia in 2013.

Authoritarian regimes do not disappear overnight. Institutions such as governments, the judiciary and the media do not immediately fall into the hands of the most liberal minds. Some time passes for that. One generation? Two generations? Of course, it also takes some time before journalists dare to write critically and independently about the government, especially if the population have never known anything but an authoritarian regime and free speech was non-existent, and if people have a lot of sympathy for the liberators.

Investigative journalism has a long tradition in countries such as the UK, the Netherlands, Scandinavian countries and Germany. But for the rest of Europe, I would go as far as to say – and I express myself carefully – there is still some growth potential. This has nothing to do with the revenue model, but everything to do with the recent past. Slowly and rather laboriously, the idea of (cross-border) investigative journalism is spreading across Europe.

Slowly but surely, investigative journalism is nevertheless finding its way into independent platforms in Europe.

#### Positive news

The good news is that with the extra funds, Journalismfund.eu can fund many more collaborations and indirectly help the quiet realisation of a growing number of European networks of investigative journalists. Without that support, those investigations would not have been realised and those small networks would not have been created.

Cross-border cooperation has many advantages. Brining journalists from different countries together increases research capacity. Journalists grow both personally and professionally in such a venture. Problems that crop up can be shared with colleagues, resulting in faster solutions. Journalists are less isolated. Journalistic research achieves a wider reach because it is also usually published in several countries at the same time, bringing net gains in power and impact. A publication in several countries acts as a safeguard against legal attacks. It is more difficult to file a complaint in multiple different countries. Complainants are aware that their attack could very well turn against them.

This kind of cooperation is obviously necessary because issues such as politics, economics, ecology and crime know no borders. Exclusively highlighting one's own region has no impact.

It is important that we can continue to provide this kind of support over a longer period of time. That continuity is crucial. *The European cross-border grant programme* has been running continuously since 2009, the Pascal Decroos Fund project since 1999. The donors and Journalismfund.eu, along with the journalists and media, build up experience and a growing network. Donors increasingly recognise that support for one year is welcome, but that real successes can only be achieved if they invest longer term in these cross-border and complex investigations. Building a strong democracy is a daily job. Democracy is not etched in stone.

As of New Year's Eve 2022, 124 journalists were locked up in European prisons, according to the European Federation of Journalists. In 2022, 13 were murdered, most of them in Ukraine. In *The Economist's Democracy Index 2021 report*, we read that 'Democratisation suffered more reversals in 2021, with the percentage of people living in a democracy falling to well below 50% and authoritarian regimes gaining ground.'

'Without facts, you can't have truth. Without truth, you can't have trust. Without trust, we have no shared reality, no democracy, and it becomes impossible to deal with our world's existential problems: climate, coronavirus, the battle for truth,' says Maria Ressa during her *Nobel Lecture*.

Should we be happy? 'What are YOU willing to sacrifice for the truth?'

## 2. MISSION

#### 2.1. OUR MISSION AND VISION

We believe that journalism is crucial to fostering living democracies throughout the European continent. We are dedicated to advancing independent and investigative journalism across Europe that serves the public interest, furthers accountability as well as transparency, and contributes to critical thinking and well-informed debate.

We aim to promote and develop professional journalism on the European continent in response to the challenges and opportunities stemming from increased digitalisation, the internationalisation of political, business and criminal power structures, as well as changing revenue models.

Journalismfund.eu vzw is a Brussels-based independent non-profit organisation incorporated by citizens in 1998. The organisation was established with the purpose of facilitating investigative, cross-border and independent journalism in order to promote democracy on the European continent by connecting donors and journalists without endangering the journalists' independence.

This is how we work:

- 1. We facilitate donors so that they can play their role supporting investigative journalism to the maximum extent possible. We therefore report very transparently on our projects.
- 2. We facilitate journalists in conducting investigative and cross-border journalism; moreover, we safeguard their independence from donors.
- 3. We help journalists disseminate their stories among citizens.

#### 2.2. OUR VALUES

- > **Independent.** We operate independently from any political or economic influences, donors or other interests. We respect the editorial independence of the journalists we work with. Our key innovation was the setup of an independent, anonymous jury to assess applications and allocate funds for journalists.
- > **Transparent.** Our board, staff members, partners and the general public know what we stand for, and how we operate and make decisions. We ask those we work with to be equally transparent. We are aware that transparency in the context of investigative journalism can expose people to risk and are therefore mindful of our requirements.
- > Collaborative. Collaboration empowers. It amplifies the impacts of journalists and journalism. Our willingness and ability to collaborate with key stakeholders in our field strengthens our strategies. Collaboration within and between our organisational structures strengthens our operations.
- **Responsive.** We act on the needs and interests of journalists and donors. We adapt to changing external and internal opportunities and threats. We walk our talk.
- > **Innovative.** We propagate new journalistic methods and skills. We encourage creative thinking and are willing to try new approaches.

# 3. OBJECTIVE I - PROMOTING INVESTIGATIVE INDEPENDENT JOURNALISM IN EUROPE

## 3.1. PUBLICATIONS WITH IMPACT

The first step in raising awareness of human rights violations, climate change, organised crime and large-scale fraud is investigating them. Public opinion **must have access to information**, which is an essential condition for a critical democratic debate. And that's exactly what journalists do: they search, dig and examine. They discover, reveal, expose. They tell their stories to readers, listeners and viewers, aid organisations and policy makers, who can then start doing what they each do best to fight those abuses.

Based on what journalists discover, reveal and expose; readers, listeners, viewers, aid organisations, and policymakers can then start doing what they each do best to fight those abuses. The following examples illustrate how the stories made with the support of <u>Journalismfund.eu</u> and published during 2022 had an impact on the issues they addressed.

#### TAKING COMPANIES TO COURT

Thanks to *this investigation*, The French Oil Company Perenco S.A. is now facing the Paris Court of Justice. This is the first case in which a French company has been held liable for environmental damage caused abroad. This case, researched by Lea Szulewicz, Dorian Cabrol, Alexandre Brutelle and Baron Nkoy, proves that Perenco S.A. had the means to act but did not take the necessary measures to prevent and stop the pollution linked to the group's oil activities in the DRC. Perenco may now be forced to repair the ecological damage already caused in the DRC to stop the pollution, and prevent future environmental damage. On the other hand, French energy transition minister Agnès Pannier-Runacher was placed at the heart of a discrete inheritance scheme linked to hedge funds based in tax haven countries. Her father, a long-serving Perenco executive, set up a company to donate a €1.2 million investment portfolio to the minister's children.

#### PUTTING INDUSTRIES AND OLIGARCHS UNDER THE SPOTLIGHT

A leading company is now under the spotlight of the European Environmental Agency for potential unlicensed extraction. As part of a cross-border project to investigate the peat extraction industries in Ireland and Latvia, the Irish investigative platform Noteworthy has examined the impacts of unlicensed peat extraction across the country. The findings of <u>that cross-border investigation</u> revealed a system of largely unregulated peat extraction that continues to this day where the Irish State has fallen short on its enforcement role, for instance failing to make any local or national authority responsible for maintaining a register of peat companies or the amount of peat extracted for commercial purposes.

<u>An investigation</u> of Šarūnas Černiauskas (Lithuania), Irma Bogdanoviciute (Lithuania) and Stanislau Ivashkevich (Belarus) followed the trail of the Belarusian elites. After that, Alexander Zaytsev and Aliaksei Aleksin, two Belarusian businessmen considered to be close to the Alexander Lukashenko regime, were officially included in the EU sanctions package that started on 21 June 2021.

When the sanctions against Aleksin and Zaytsev were imposed, the official sanction implementation decision mirrored the team's stories to a large extent. Companies mentioned in the stories were indicated to be the source of the oligarchs' benefiting from their relationship with the regime, further stressing the importance of the investigative work.

'Sometimes, it takes years for an investigative story to have a clear impact. Sometimes, it never happens. In this case, international sanctions came 8 months after we ran our first story, and this is the first time when my work makes this kind of an impact. In my perspective, investigative journalism isn't about punishing people. It's about getting the truth out to the world - even from regimes as tight as the one in Belarus. And once the truth is out, change will come sooner or later,' team leader Sarunas Cerniauskas underlines.

#### PUTTING PRESSURE ON LAWMAKERS

EU lawmakers are now under pressure to act after a <u>cross border investigation</u> revealed that 70,000 to 90,000 annual asbestos-related deaths occur in Europe — not including the growing number of cancers by exposure at homes, schools, hospitals and offices. The European Parliament asked for a broad asbestos strategy under different headings. The headings include a framework directive binding members to act, new occupational exposure limits (OEL) for workers 100 times lower than the present OEL, a compulsory register of buildings where asbestos is present, and a pan-EU recognition and compensation scheme for asbestos victims.

#### GENERATING PROSECUTOR'S INVESTIGATIONS

A French anti-terrorist prosecutor's office <u>has opened</u> a preliminary investigation into the association SOS Chrétiens d'Orient, regarding complicity in war crimes and crimes against humanity, based on the investigation by journalists Ariane Lavrilleux, Frank Andrews, and Elie Guckert.

In Italy, two months after the broadcast of The Logging Business, a video investigation, the prominent anti-mafia public prosecutor Nicola Gratteri coordinated a big police operation with arrests on the woody biomass supply chain in Calabria. The CEOs of the 5 Calabrian biomass facilities are now under investigation for fraud for having asked for undue public subsidies and for having burned wood that originated in illegally logged forests. The same supported project led the Italian party M5S to withdraw its vote for the request for incentives for forestry biomass power plants and to state that 'there are controversial issues regarding biomass.'

#### **BRINGING INSTANT CHANGE**

The research by journalists Eelco van Wieringen (Buro Publieke Werken, Holland), Micael Pereira (Expresso Portugal), and Twan Kroon (researcher, Holland) showed that the age of port wines is often incorrect. Based on that investigation, some port wines were reported to the Food Fraud Network, a partnership of the European food authorities, and in some countries like the Netherlands, some port wines have been withdrawn for sale. 'Deception with port" research had an immediate impact on its first publication. Something similar happened after research that asked if the EU's craze for lithium fuels destructive mining operations in Serbia. The Jadar mining project is on hold now.

#### 3.2. INCREASING APPLICATIONS FOR SUPPORT

#### APPLICATIONS

In 2022 Journalismfund.eu received **384 applications** (from 885 applicants) for 8 grant programmes: European Cross-Border Local, European Cross Border (ECBG), Pascal Decroos Fund, Pascal Decroos Fund Low Countries, Science Journalism grants, Modern Slavery Unveiled Project, investigation grants for Environmental Journalism, Professional Development Grants for Environmental Journalism. For an overview of the goals, scope, grants, stories and impact of the grant programmes, see Annexes 5.2 to 5.12.

The grant applicants were domiciled in 84 different countries, see the table below.

#### GRANTEES

In 2022, we supported 203 projects or **490 grantees** (211 female, 202 male). The grantees are domiciled in 56 different countries.

The average age of the grantees is 41. 65% are freelance journalists, 41% male and 43% female. 13% are novices, 71% are experienced journalists (more than 2 years of experience).



#### MONEY TRAIL



- Naipanoi Lepapa became Journalist of the Year with her story on surrogacy in Kenya. Lepapa was among the journalists to receive an award at the 2022 Annual Journalism Excellence Awards (AJEA)

held in Nairobi on Friday, May 6. At the awards organised by the Media Council of Kenya (MCK), Naipanoi was crowned Journalist of the Year in recognition of her investigative articles at the outlet.

Journalist Naipanoi Lepapa was included in the list of Top 100 Kenyans of 2022 for her investigation on the surrogacy industry in Kenya.

- > Investigation about destructive mining operations in Serbia was nominated for the Dejan Anastasijević investigative journalism award in Belgrade. Ingrid Gercama, Nemanja Rujević and Natalie Bertrams investigated the EU's craze for lithium causing loss of biodiversity and pollution in Serbia.

#### INVESTIGATIONS GRANTS FOR ENVIRONMENTAL JOURNALISM



An investigation into Pollution of the Poultry Industry in Ireland won *The Business Analyst of the Year Journalism Award*. Journalists Niall Sargent (Noteworthy.ie), Rory Winters, Luke Butterly and Tommy Greene (The Detail), and Ella McSweeney (The Guardian) investigated the environmental impacts of the poultry industry in Ireland and the United Kingdom as it expands in line with state policy.

#### MODERN SLAVERY UNVEILED



An investigation into Indian workers exploited in Italy won the 2022 Global Media Competition on Labour Migration award. Journalists Daniela Sala (Italy), Ankita Anand (India) and Marco Valle (Italy) investigated how, through debt, a network of intermediaries linking India to the Pontine countryside keeps thousands of Indian workers under blackmail and exploited in one of the largest fruit and vegetable districts in Europe.

## 3.5. TRAINING AND MENTORING PROGRAMME

#### INTERNATIONAL INVESTIGATIVE JOURNALISM – POST-ACADEMIC (MECHELEN)

The course targets people with a master's degree in any subject (or with a bachelor's degree in journalism) and provides insight into how a successful, properly substantiated and credible investigative journalism project can be set up. The course consists of three modules: Investigative journalism, International reporting and Portfolio. The course takes 136 hours and takes place on Tuesday and Thursday evenings (throughout the academic year).

The ultimate goal of the course is to teach students how to make news. The students are familiarised with techniques of which mainstream journalists have little or no knowledge. For instance, considerable attention is paid to data analysis and visualisation, searching on the internet, making use of Freedom of Information legislation, archives, etc. Considerable attention is also paid to cross-border collaboration and entrepreneurship.

The guest lecturers are all experts in their field with extensive experience: Evert De Vos (*Groene Amsterdammer*), Henk Van Ess (*Poynter, Bellingcat*), Peter Teffer (*Follow the Money*), Peter Verlinden (former Belgian public broadcaster VRT journalist), Kristof Clerix (investigative journalist for *Knack*), Luuk Sengers (*Story-Based Inquiry*), to name a few. Every year, we also schedule a guest lecture given by a former IRJ student who successfully completed the course and is now working as a journalist.

#### TRAINING UNDER THE MODERN SLAVERY UNVEILED PROJECT



In the framework of Modern Slavery Unveiled grant programme, training courses were provided on online safety and collaboration with CSOs. Journalism in its essence entails the investigation and production of articles. Journalismfund.eu also deployed a training programme for journalists and civil society organisations. This training programme consists of several online sessions where journalists and Civil Society Organisations are encouraged to upskill in different topics regarding human trafficking, modern slavery and forced labour.

#### Ethics and journalism: Reporting human trafficking responsibly

This webinar discussed ethical guidelines for journalists when reporting on victims and survivors of human trafficking, sexual exploitation, and labour abuse. It also explored the possibility of collaborating with civil society organisations that share the goal of ending modern slavery. Speakers included Aidan White, Charles Autheman, and Wahyu Dhyatmika. #### Promoting NGO – media partnerships: reporting on human trafficking

This webinar discussed the role of journalists and other media representatives in raising awareness of human trafficking, reducing vulnerabilities and holding governments, law enforcement and businesses to account. A major focus was placed on the cooperation of NGOs and (investigative) journalists; the expectations of both parties for such partnerships and recommendations for more efficient partnerships, respecting the independence of journalists. Speakers included Merel Brouwer, Suzanne Hoff, Marija Andjelkovic, Sasa Dragojlo and Lam Le. For this online session we collaborated with La Strada International. #### The Survivor Voice: Interviewing Victims of Human Trafficking

Interviewing a person who has been a victim of human trafficking raises several ethical questions regarding the sensitivity of the topic and the traumatic history of each survivor. As journalists continue to cover stories related to modern slavery, it can be helpful to have a better understanding of how to interview survivors of these type of crimes. This webinar provided tips for interviewing survivors of human trafficking, forced labour and sexual exploitation. A major focus was placed on how to conduct interviews that minimise re-traumatisation and yield evidence of the victim's experience of the crime. It also approached other strategies to effectively interview victims of trauma such as building rapport as the first step when getting

in touch with victims. Speakers included Sanne Terlingen and an anonymous survivor of modern slavery. Thanks to the suggestion of Survivor Alliance (Porticus partner), we contacted a survivor to be part of this online session as a presenter. Her identity was kept confidential and we did not record her intervention for security purposes. Attendees appreciated the inclusion of survivors in the session, and once again we made use of our Porticus network to deliver a successful event. #### Safety and Security: How to Overcome Risks When Investigating Human Trafficking

An important training need already identified for this webinar is security, both digital and physical. For investigative journalists and CSOs to do their work and expose cases of human trafficking and abuse, they need to be able to conduct their work in a safe, enabling environment. Through the security training, participants will be empowered to create this environment and safeguard themselves from abuse and fall-out related to their work. Speakers include Annie Kelly and Ian Urbina. For this online session we directly contacted the speakers, and the Outlaw Ocean Project assisted us with some promotion. One week later, as a repercussion of the importance of what has been said during the webinar, the Global Investigative Journalism Network (GIJN) prepared a news article with the tips provided by our speakers, this article has been shared several times on social media (see image below), you can read the news article here titled 'Best practices for staying safe while investigating human trafficking'.

Finally, Journalismfund.eu's in-person Modern Slavery Unveiled training took place in Manila from the 21 to 25 November, 2022. <u>Journalism for Nation Building Foundation</u> (JNBF) and <u>Rappler</u> were the local organisers of the 5-day training for Southeast Asian journalists and civil society organisations on modern slavery reportage. The 30 participants were composed of 24 journalists and 6 CSO representatives. The attendees came from different countries such as Cambodia, Indonesia, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam. The training also involved the participation of 16 trainers who were journalists, Civil Society Representatives and experts on human trafficking.

#### TRAINING PROGRAMME EARTH INVESTIGATIONS PROGRAMME



This webinar organised in-house on 24 May 2022, tackled the context in which environmental journalists write an investigative story. The online session held on Zoom brought together 46 environmental journalists as well as members of supported organisations. The online webinar was dedicated to the community of environmental journalists and addressed the global context of the environmental ecosystem and the extent to which a story can have an impact, by identifying the different dynamics and actors that are accountable in terms of climate change. For this, the webinar aimed to look at two different approaches presented by Stephane Horel and Mark Schapiro.

'Skill Up: Data Journalism and Visualisation'. This training session was led by two veteran data journalists, Helena Bengtsson and Amanda Cox, who demonstrated how to think using different data tools and dive deeper into visualisation. Data journalism can help a journalist tell a complex story through engaging infographics. This training session showcased how to effectively use data journalism techniques to improve an investigative story. For this online session on Zoom, 154 people registered and 53 attended, making the attendance rate 34%. The recording can be watched here.

#### 'Using Data to Explain the Magnitude of Climate Change'

This training was set out to introduce the users to environmental data-driven journalism. We discussed broadly how data can be used to write about the environment. Stemming from the Global Climate Change dashboard, the audience was introduced to the data sources and tools that can be used in data journalism, and how to use them to narrate global phenomena. Speakers included Ornaldo Gjergji and Matteo Moretti, environmental data experts. In total 75 people registered and 35 attended, making the attendance rate 47%. #### MENTORING PROGRAMME (UNDER ECB GRANTS, MSU, CBL AND ENV1 GRANTS)



For teams that need support in terms of investigation skills, a mentor can be appointed. We can propose calling on a mentor during a prior dialogue with the team applying for a grant. The mentors are selected based on the focus of the investigation or in view of their competence in a specific skill. Having the help of a mentor can have a significant positive impact on a team and its story. Teams of journalists less experienced in the field of cross-border investigative stories can particularly benefit from help from more experienced colleagues. The jury can also make the award of a grant subject to collaboration with a mentor.

Over the last five years (2018-2022) Journalism fund.eu's pool of mentors had a significant positive influence on the teams of journalists, processes of their investigations and results of the stories.

#### CAPACITY BUILDING - MENTORING

In 2022 the project coordinators spent approximately 107 hours guiding and coordinating the mentors. During 2022, five teams of European Cross-Border Grants were still working with a mentor for their investigation to be published in 2023. Under the Investigation Grants for Environmental Journalism, 16 teams received a mentor. Two teams of the European Cross-Border Local Grant Programme received a mentor in 2022. Based on the requirements of the teams, Journalismfund.eu expanded its pool of mentors to provide more specific support to journalists.

# 4. OBJECTIVE II – FACILITATING NETWORKS OF JOURNALISTS IN EUROPE

## 4.1. GRANTEES AT CONFERENCES

Journalismfund.eu considers it important that journalists are given the opportunity to share experiences and knowledge with colleagues and fellow journalists at conferences. Journalists who have been given a European Cross-Border Grant (ECB) and an Investigation Grant for Environmental Journalism (ENV1), share their experiences at conferences after the publication of their reports and, in doing so, help and inspire their colleagues. We believe that the more successful investigation projects turn out, the more journalists will want to investigate corruption, tax evasion and other financial injustices and the more budget media will want to make available for it.

10 grantees went to the following conferences with the support of Journalismfund.eu: Dig Festival (Modena), African Investigative Journalism Conference (Johannesburg), VVOJ conference (Leiden), European Journalism Symposium (Brussels).

## 4.2. LECTURES / EXTERNAL REPRESENTATION

Over the year, Journalismfund.eu attended several online conferences and networking events to promote our grants and organisation. With its networking activities, Journalismfund.eu tries to convince journalists to start a cross-border investigative journalism project and lower the threshold for this. After two years in which we attended several online events, this year Journalismfund.eu could finally attend in-person events that were very useful to keep fulfilling our mission.

## 5.2. EUROPEAN CROSS-BORDER GRANTS (ECBG) - PROJECT

## PURPOSE

Over the past decade, European Cross-Border grants have stimulated cross-border journalism by making it possible for hundreds of European journalists to undertake in-depth independent investigations. In the past few years, the number of transnational investigations has risen sharply, leading to substantive political, legislative and other changes in Europe.

In 2022, our goal was to maintain a strong journalism community around European Cross-Border grants (grantees, alumni, mentors and advisory group members). We also aimed to attract young talent to the larger decentralised network of investigative journalists across Europe, as well as to increase the quality of cross-border journalism through its practice.

Today independent cross-border investigative journalism is needed more than ever to find solutions to increasingly complex problems like climate change, inequality, pandemics and so on. The fast-growing number of applications shows the increasing demand of independent cross-border investigative journalism, and the growing need for funding this type of resource-intensive reporting. Journalismfund.eu is the only organisation that is funding so many cross-border investigative journalistic projects in Europe (and for such a long period).

With the <u>European Cross-Border grant programme</u> Journalismfund.eu aims to further contribute to the development of a vital European public sphere by enabling investigations into issues of common interest to European citizens.

The programme, running since 2009, supports professional journalists who have good ideas for cross-border investigations with a focus on European topics. Cross-border teams can apply for a grant to cover working time and expenses for their joint investigations. In addition to a grant, teams can also apply for a mentor to provide assistance with either the focus of the investigation or the need for competences in a specific skill.

The programme supports teams of professional journalists from at least two European countries who have good ideas for a cross-border investigation with a focus on European topics. To be eligible, the journalists should be living in geographical Europe or a Council of Europe country. When relevant to the story, team members from elsewhere can be accepted, too.

#### ECBG GRANT OVERVIEW

Journalismfund.eu has a strong belief in cross-border cooperation between European journalists as the best way to tell the major international stories of the 21st century. The organisation supports teams of journalists from different countries, who usually work on a joint story from their respective countries. This enables them to combine their investigative skills and to publish their work in different countries, which is considered important when addressing the different European target groups and for generating maximum impact.

#### **OVERVIEW GRANTEES**

Our European Cross-Border Grants Programme is very inclusive. We are currently supporting journalists who live in the member states of the European Council (geographical Europe). If relevant for the story, team members from beyond this region can be accepted as well.

As a result, for the reporting period of 2022, 21 projects were supported with 62 grantees. The jury came together 4 times and awarded a total sum of €232,880.

The largest grant received in 2022 was €15,900. The average grant for the reporting period was €3,756 per grantee.

#### PROFILE OF THE GRANTEES

In 2022, of the 62 journalists who received a grant, 33 were women and 29 were men. The average age was 37. Forty-three of the grantees were working as freelancers, 19 as employees.

Grantees came from 26 different countries, with the UK (6) as the most represented, followed by Poland, France & Germany (5), Italy, Romania and the Netherlands (4).

### 5.3. EUROPEAN CROSS-BORDER LOCAL GRANT PROGRAMME

### PURPOSE

This grant programme supports local cross-border investigative teams of professional journalists and/or news outlets to bring the locals to the European level as well as to local citizens all over Europe.

Compelling stories can be found everywhere, even at the local level. This grant programme aims to address the shortage of local journalists and award grants to local investigative and in-depth journalistic projects. The key aspect of this programme is cross-border collaboration, which will allow interested local journalists and/or media outlets to explore possible solutions using extensive resources. This project also aims to spur more critical thinking about society's pressing problems, increase the level of debate, and foster civic engagement. The grant can also offer support to preliminary work in the development of new investigative and in-depth projects.

#### **STATISTICS**

For the Local Cross-Border Journalism grant programme, in 2022 we received 36 applications with 121 applicants. The total amount applied was €625,687.66.

Of the 121 applicants, 33 were men, 45 were women and 43 local media outlets.

#### **OVERVIEW OF GRANTEES**

Our Local Cross-Border Journalism grant programme is very inclusive, with eligibility covering members of the European Union, as well as Bosnia and Herzegovina, Iceland, Norway, Liechtenstein, Albania, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Serbia, Georgia, Ukraine and Tunisia. If relevant for the story, teams from non-EU member states can apply with a team member from one of the eligible countries.

As a result, for the reporting period of 2022, 20 projects were supported with 68 journalists and local media outlet grantees.

The jury met 3 times and awarded a total sum of €280,470.00.

In 2022, of the 68 applicants who received a grant, 21 were men, 25 were women, and 22 were local media outlets. The average age is 37.

#### OVERVIEW OF GRANTS PUBLISHED IN 2022

The Local Cross-Border Journalism grant programme had three calls for applications during 2022, so far only two of the granted projects have been published.

# 5.5. EXTRA CALL: EMERGENCY FUND FOR LOCAL JOURNALISM (FLANDERS)

In 2020, many actors in the Belgian media sector were facing problems because of the federal measures taken by the Belgian National Security Council to limit the spread of the coronavirus COVID-19. On 2 June 2020, the Flemish Government made a final decision on the amount of emergency funds to be used to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic. The Flemish Government entrusted Journalismfund.eu, through the Pascal Decroos Fund, with the task of distributing grants for local projects by freelance journalists who have little access to other support measures. Twenty-seven projects (for 37 grantees) were awarded a total amount of €139,357. Eighteen of these projects were published in 2021, 4 in 2022, and the remaining 5 projects are to come out in 2023.

## 5.10. THE MODERN SLAVERY UNVEILED PROJECT

#### PURPOSE

This grant programme aims to enable independent journalistic investigations into the exploitation of Asian victims of human trafficking and forced labour in Europe.

Cross-border teams of professional journalists can apply for a grant to cover working time and/or expenses to investigate, document and expose aspects and cases of forced labour, cross-continental trafficking and other issues related to the exploitation of Asian victims in Europe.

In addition to a grant, teams can also apply for a mentor to provide assistance with either the focus of the investigation or the need for competences in a specific skill.

In 2022, the Modern Slavery Unveiled Grant programme received 18 applications, one of which was not eligible. Out of the 17 eligible applications, 9 projects were granted.

Of the 74 applicants, 33 were men and 41 women. Fifteen journalists worked as a permanent members of staff and 59 as freelance journalists.

# 5.11. INVESTIGATIONS GRANTS FOR ENVIRONMENTAL JOURNALISM

#### PURPOSE

This grant programme supports cross-border teams of professional journalists and/or news outlets to conduct investigations into environmental affairs related to continental Europe.

While news media and newsrooms still predominantly operate nationally, most power structures and societal and environmental problems transcend national boundaries. This grant programme is therefore aimed at cross-border teams of investigative journalists and newsrooms to investigate and document illegal, unreported and unregulated abuse of nature that involves European affairs in and outside Europe.

In addition to investigations of environmental issues that transcend borders, this programme can also support and stimulate comparative investigations into local environmental issues and policies between two or more regions or cities.

The grants can also offer support to preliminary work in the development of new investigative projects.

The grant can cover working time and expenses such as logistics, travel, insurance, access to legal support, translations, access to technology and data sets, etc.

In addition to financial support, teams can also apply for an experienced mentor to provide assistance with either the focus of the investigation or the need for competences in a specific skill.

#### OVERVIEW AND STATISTICS (APPLICANTS VS. GRANTEES)

In 2022 the Environmental Journalism Grant had a total of 341 applicants from 84 countries.

Approximately 68% of applicants have declared themselves to be freelancers, while only 34 were employed by media companies. Among our applicants in 2022 we had also 73 media organisations.

In 2022 Journalism fund eu contributed to investigations by 214 journalists, of which 148 were freelancers and 24 employees, while the number of organisations that received our grant last year was 38.

Journalismfund.eu has granted €1,357,802 to 73 different projects, which makes for an average of €18,600 per project. From the presented data we can see that 59% of the projects that apply get awarded an Environmental Journalism Grant, a good sign of how competitive the grant programme is.

# 5.12. PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT GRANTS FOR ENVIRONMENTAL JOURNALISM

#### PURPOSE

The services grants programme aims to support activities and services for environmental investigative journalism. It supports and incites initiatives generated by organisations in the field, and seeks to promote collective development and support services for environmental investigative journalism, by providing funding to project ideas from organisations and institutions for training and professional development programmes, i.e. skills-focused professional training or fellowship programmes targeted at enabling investigative journalists to upskill with regards to reporting on environment-related issues. This is part of a larger programme: *The Earth Investigations Programme* supported by Arcadia.

#### STATISTICS ENV2 GRANTS (APPLICANTS VERSUS GRANTEES)

Because of the specificity of this grant programme, the grantees can only be organisations and therefore we do not have a gender, age or professional level breakdown as we have in other grants. Journalismfund. eu's jury awarded grants to 17 projects out of 44 applications.

Journalismfund.eu distributed €241,270 to 15 supported projects, organised by 17 grantees, in the first year of the programme. A success rate of only 34% puts this grant among our most competitive programmes.

# 1. Sources, Security and Storytelling: online course series for investigative journalists reporting on climate change in the Western Balkans

The project provided localised versions – for Serbia, Bosnia and Herzegovina and Montenegro as primary target countries – of an existing three-part series of self-paced online learning courses on environmental reporting. Localisation meant both the adaptation of the existing content to the local language and the use of local examples and case studies, highlighting local experts, and using visuals that would resonate with local audiences.

The course is available on Thomson's Online Learning Platform JournalismNow.

The course was launched on 28 July and by 14 September had already gathered 286 registrations, which proves there is an interest in training materials in the local language in the WB region. Because of language proximity, this course can also be used by media professionals in Croatia.

Organisation: Thomson Media gGmbH is a non-profit organisation based in Berlin, Germany devoted to truthful and unbiased journalism as a way of promoting civil society and fostering a balanced public discourse. It is the German partner of the Thomson Foundation, the longest established media development

## 2. Increasing the role of media in highlighting environmental issues due to the Russian Invasion

This project aimed to increase awareness among the public and decision-makers in Ukraine and Europe about ecological problems emerging as a result of the Russian invasion of Ukraine. Through an online discussion and a small grants programme, the Internews Ukraine (IUA) team facilitated the coverage of warfare ecology issues by Ukrainian journalists, including investigative journalists. As a result of this programme, 48 news items were produced and published, drawing much-needed attention to ecological issues in Ukraine during the war and creating a base for future investigations of the effects of Russia's invasion on the environment in Ukraine.

The online discussion for regional media outlets saw the participation of 60 journalists and media representatives. Most of them came from the regions of Ukraine most affected by the war. The online discussion agenda included four panels covering issues such as: environmental threats and consequences of hostilities on Ukrainian territories, challenges for nature protection in wartime conditions, and recording of Russia's ecological crimes. The video recording of this event already has 74 views on YouTube.

In order to make use of the knowledge obtained during the online discussions, the IUA team implemented the small grants competition for media outlets. Within this programme, 16 media outlets produced and published 48 media pieces on warfare ecology issues in Ukraine and the negative impact of the Russian invasion on the environment. Among the popular topics covered by the Program's participants were the following: effects of missile attacks on the environment, pollution of rivers and underground waters, ecological disaster in the city of Mariupol after it was destroyed by the Russian occupiers, nuclear danger due to the capture of Chornobyl and Zaporizhzhia nuclear power stations, declining biodiversity and flora, the situation of Ukrainian nature parks and reserves in the occupied territories.

The article 'Drop by drop: how contaminated water kills' by Larysa Romaniuk (the Gre4ka.info website) became popular and caused a discussion on social media. In this material, the citizens of Kropyvnytskiy found out how drinking water from local wells and springs harms their health. Many readers, primarily mothers of children, contacted the editorial office to obtain more in-depth information. These women also told journalists that in the maternity hospital, they were asked to sign a special document that obliges staff only to give filtered water to mothers of new-born because of the water contamination in Kropyvnytskyi wells and springs.

One of the key directions of the organisation's work is in the sphere of communications, specifically implementation of informational campaigns on social issues, media production, PR and communications support, training and consulting. IUA's mission lies in strengthening European values in Ukraine by developing its media sector.

#### 3. #Wildeye Europe training and professional support programme

A team of five data journalists engaged in a tailor-made five-month training programme on how to use data tools in investigative journalism and environmental storytelling. The training was delivered in four modules and one final e-learning event:

Module 1: Using data to enhance environmental journalism

Module 2: Using the law to access environmental crime data

Module 3: Tools of the trade

Module 4: Building a Community of Practice

Shared Learning Event: Investigating environmental crime in Europe

The final event, which was the only one open to the wider audience, had more than 70 people registered and 33 attendees, of which more than 90% identified as journalists or media outlet representatives.

Over the course of the programme, the participants collected a total of 206 new data points, as well as updates to cases already published on the #WildEye Europe map. The majority of incidents took place between 2018 and 2022, and mainly focused on seizures (68%), followed by convictions (12%), arrests (11%) and court cases (9%).

Oxpeckers' approach is innovative, accurate, strategic and linked to broader social and economic issues.

Since its inception Oxpeckers has pioneered environmental reporting in the digital era by combining traditional investigative journalism techniques with data-driven forensic analysis and best-of-breed mapping visualisations. Complex stories are told visually using dynamic infographics, animated maps and data visualisations that augment more traditional story packages. Journalistic collaborations headed by Oxpeckers have changed lives, policies and laws. Several of the unit's benchmark projects have been replicated in other parts of the world, and have received global recognition. Oxpeckers has built comprehensive data sets of environmental crimes in Europe, Asia and Africa. We are using these in pioneering data-driven reporting, tracking and training projects aimed at building capacity among journalists in these regions, and providing them with professional support.
