

THE INVESTIGATION- A BROAD AND AMBITIOUS TOPIC

Some issues:

Are there common national guidelines?

Are there dedicated and sufficient funding and specialized staff?

Do teachers have the necessary training and skills and what would they need more?

What are the best practices for the intercultural dialogue?





THE INVESTIGATION: DEFINING COMMON GUIDELINES AND CRITERIA





Common quidelines:


- age target
- -interviews to teachers and pupils
- -training with a child therapist
- at least 2 sample schools for countries in 2 different cities
- -common schema for interviews
- common criteria for photo portraits

Periodical group meetings/ periodical reports to the JF











INTERVIEWS QUESTIONS FOR TEACHERS/OTHER STAFF: information and personal opinions

RECORD INTERVIEWS (AUDIO AND EVENTUALLY VIDEO) to have a comparative picture

Some of these questions can be used for a school director who is not teaching

- Introduction: What do you teach/ general description of the school, age and type of school/ appr. number or percentage of native born and migrants/ example of nationalities in a classroom ecc.
- 1. What happen when a new student not speaking the language arrive from another country, how is the procedure and what kind of staff and activities are used for her/him? Does this follow a national scheme or not?
- 2. Can you describe me the main difficulties of migrant students you work with, both emotionally and relative to learning? Could you pick some cases? (also referring to particular cultural groups?)



CHALLENGES: SETTING UP AND WORKING IN A GROUP

-problems of a large group

-different views of work

- the "informal" coordinator

THE ROLE OF THE MENTOR

Give a different shape to the group dynamics with "objective", external supervision and point of view

Support in overcoming blocks and difficulties

Give specific technical advice (ex. support with sources, interview methodology, sharpen the focus of the story)

CHALLENGES: WRITING THE PROJECT

- Time to plan is not a waste time
- -Planning the <u>budget</u>
- -Structure of the budget: salary (weeks for participant) / expenses
- Unexpected expenses : how to deal with
- Budget /final financial report

CHALLENGES: USING AND COMPARING DATA

Not homogenous data/ databases

Ex. "migrant students" (defined by language/citizenship)

Statistics (UE/ NOT UE)

Need for a specialised data journalist?

CHALLENGES: TIMING AND SCHEDULING

- -a balance between personal and group scheduling
- -bureaucracy issues in more countries can slow down the process (ex. access to schools/consent form for minors)
- balance between plan and flexibility is needed

CONCLUSION: THE ADDED VALUE OF CROSS-BORDER

-EXCHANGING VIEWS IS INSPIRING

-WIDER PERSPECTIVES FOR LOCAL STORIES

-GREATER CHANCES FOR PUBLICATION

-A MULTIPLIER: NEW IDEAS

CONCLUSIONS: LESSONS LEARNED AND TIPS

BEFORE (PRE-APPLICATION PHASE):

LESS IS BETTER (3-4 members group is ideal – more focused topics)

KNOW BEFORE YOUR COLLEAGUES (common ground: share clearly goals, expected times ecc)

CHOOSE WELL YOUR TOPIC: (expertise/ focus/ impact)

PLAN WITH SOME FLEXIBILITY (ex. calculate 20% time more and 20% expenses more then expected)

CONSIDER A MENTORSHIP

TROUGHOUT THE INVESTIGATION

- BE CLEAR ON THE DUTIES AND THE ROLE OF EACH ONE
- WORK ON SHARED FILES ON THE COMMON/MAIN ISSUES
- SET UP PERIODICAL MEETINGS IN ADVANCE

-BE CLEAR ABOUT AUTHORSHIPS/COPYRIGHTS/ EARNINGS
